MINUTES Regular Meeting November 18, 2015

The Solano County Board of Education met in regular session on Wednesday, November 18, 2015, at the Solano County Office of Education (SCOE), 5100 Business Center Drive in Fairfield, California.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

Board President Michelle Coleman called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. Terri Bush, SCOE's School Attendance Liaison, was chosen from the audience and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

VI. CORRESPONDENCE

VII. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- (a) Recognition of Winners of Attendance Awareness Month Contest

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson stated that SCOE has held an Attendance Awareness Month contest for the past two years in recognition of Attendance Awareness Month in September. There were over 200 participants who created posters and public service announcements (PSA), which are posted on SCOE's website, and our 12 generous partners, such as First 5 Solano, Fairfield and Suisun Transit (F.A.S.T.), Stars Recreation Center, Kaiser Permanente, NorthBay Healthcare, Jump Highway, Scandia Family Fun Center, Round Table Pizza, Dickey's Barbecue Pit, KUIC Radio, the San Francisco Giants baseball organization, and Driven Raceway, provided the prizes.

Terri Bush, School Attendance Liaison, reported that students from local school districts participated. The PSA contest recognized 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Place award winners, and the poster contest awarded, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Place awards in each of the three categories (grades kindergarten-4, 5-8, and 9-12) for a total of nine winners.

The Board recognized two students from SCOE's Transition Program at Golden Hills Education Center who won in the 9-12 grade category. Kevin Anderson, Jr., won 1st Place and was present, along with his family and friends, to receive a certificate and prizes. Julie Vazquez, who won 2nd Place, was unable to attend. The winning posters will be displayed at SCOE's main office until next year's contest.

- (b) Facilities Projects Update

Alton Gay, Director of Facilities, Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation, reported on the status of SCOE's current eight facilities projects. He reviewed the design and project costs for three modernization/new construction combination projects:

- Armijo High School campus demolition of five old portable buildings that will be replaced by two new ones
- T.C. McDaniel Center demolition of the existing building to build a new one and moving some buildings owned by Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District (FSUSD) to increase parking
- Irene Larsen Center is awaiting funding to build new classrooms and a new administration building, but it requires a 40-year lease, which SCOE has been working with the State Legislature to acquire.

The five modernization projects will bring old buildings up to code with the Americans with Disabilities Act and create better learning environments for SCOE programs at Golden Hills Education Center, Golden West Middle School in the Travis Unified School District (TUSD), Grange Middle School and K.I. Jones Elementary School in FSUSD, and the Silveyville campus in the Dixon Unified School District (DUSD).

All projects except Larsen are presently unfunded and waiting for the State to pass a new facilities bond. Since SCOE cannot obtain a bond to fund its facilities projects, as districts are able to do,

the design funding comes from the State's financial hardship program. Then SCOE applies for construction funding through a statewide bond. The next one is scheduled for 2016 and, if it passes, the Governor sells bonds to fund it. SCOE's goal is to be on the waiting list and in line to receive money.

Over the summer, a few deferred maintenance projects were complete such as parking lot improvements at T.C. McDaniel and Larsen to reseal and restripe the surface and eliminate trip hazards as well as replace roofs, siding, windows, and heating/air conditioning units to improve energy efficiency in buildings 2, 6, and 7 at Golden Hills.

(c) Arts Integration and Learning

Gethsemane Patton, Program Manager of Instructional Support and Professional Development, provided an update on arts integration with instruction and shared highlights from coursework provided to teachers and administrators through the Arts Integrated Learning Special Program with Solano County.

The Program was launched during the summer of 2015 and based on Harvard research that found it is crucial for students to learn arts in different methodologies and in various courses. SCOE partnered with the Alameda County Office of Education to develop accessible professional development for that will give students access to the arts.

Teachers throughout the county participate in the Visual and Performing Arts Council where they can discuss common issues and receive demonstrations from a local artist on project and technique based learning. The first meeting was held on October 13th and upcoming meetings will be held on January 13th and March 2nd at SCOE. Ms. Patton invited the Board Members to attend.

She also extended an invitation to the Artists Reception at SCOE from 5:00-6:30 PM on May 17, 2016. This marks the start of the Art Faire during which art by students countywide will be on display through May 24th. This event grows larger each year.

Sandy Jessop, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services, stated that Ms. Patton has been with SCOE for about four years. She is responsible for all professional development for educators and administrators, and she has begun several programs that involve the participation of our districts to transform art teaching as a gateway to the Common Core and students' formative thinking. Starting January 1st, she is being promoted to the position of Director of Educational Services.

(d) Leadership Academy

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson announced that Janet Harden, Associate Superintendent of Human Resources/Workforce Development/Public Information, was ill and unable to attend the meeting and will report on SCOE's Leadership Academy at the Board's regular meeting in December.

(e) Charter School Appeals Fact Sheet

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson distributed and reviewed a Charter School Appeals Fact Sheet developed with legal counsel in response to the Board's request during its Special Meeting/Study Session held on August 28, 2015.

(f) Annual *Williams* Lawsuit Settlement Report

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson reviewed a summary of this year's site visits to identified schools in Solano County and any corrective actions that may have been needed pertaining to the sufficiency of textbooks and instructional materials, teacher vacancy or misassignment, and adequacy of facilities. (Attachment J)

Pursuant to Education Code section 1240, SCOE is required to report each year on site visits and audits of schools in deciles 1-3 of the 2012 Academic Performance Index (API). Schools in DUSD, FSUSD, Vacaville Unified School District (VUSD), and Vallejo City Unified School District (VCUSD)

were reviewed. The purpose is to ensure that students have sufficient instructional materials; facilities are in good repair with no urgent health, safety, or cleanliness concerns; and Ms. Patton reviews their Local Control and Accountability Plans (LCAP) to verify that School Accountability Report Cards (SARC) are current, accurate, and there are no teacher misassignments or uniform complaints. The process is very time intensive for staff. All school visits and written reports must be completed by the end of the fourth week of school. The information is then provided to each of the involved school districts, their governing boards, the Solano County Board of Supervisors, and this Board.

When the API began in 2006, the cohort of schools changed every three years - some schools would drop off the list and others would be added. The State has not updated the API decile list since the new standards were adopted. Under the new accountability system, an LCAP evaluation rubric has been created, and that may lead to changes in this reporting process, which will require revisions to the Education Code.

(g) Human Resources Report

Due to Mrs. Harden's absence, there was no report on routine personnel matters.

(h) Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) Update

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson provided a routine update on SCOE's LCAP progress thus far. Nicola Parr, Director of Student and Program Support, is leading the efforts, and we are collecting data such as the number of students helped by transition services at the Juvenile Detention Facility (JDF) and community school, expulsion figures, professional development provided, amount of career and college readiness programs, etc.

The California Department of Education (CDE) has provided technical support to SCOE, as we do to our districts, and a team will meet with representatives of CDE who will provide us with feedback on our LCAP.

Stakeholder engagement meetings are underway and more are planned. A schedule will be provided to the Board in case Members wish to attend. As in prior years, participants will review the focus areas, goals, actions, and strategies of our LCAP; provide feedback on how we are serving the students; discuss survey results; and talk about how to effectively use the collected data results. This will tell us if we are moving in the right direction.

In response to a question about the recent release of the new balanced assessment test results, Mrs. Estrella-Henderson stated that the districts are pleased that it is baseline date, as it allows room to improve. It shows where there are gaps in teaching and learning and helps us determine plans for needed professional development and next steps. Mr. Ford stated that EdSource had issued a lot of information about it including ideas on how to improve. Mrs. Jessop said the Curriculum and Instruction Committee had been discussing the matter at its monthly meeting. Additional testing is not the answer; the assessments are to guide the teaching, provide information along the way, and help determine next steps.

Trustee Coleman remarked that a group from Fremont had presented at a recent Masters of Governance session she attended. They provided an infographic on each goal of their LCAP. It was easy to understand and would be helpful in explaining the concepts and funding to members of the public. She will send the link to Mrs. Estrella-Henderson who welcomed the resource, as that is the direction Mrs. Parr is headed to help our stakeholders gain a better understanding.

(j) Temporary Certificates

Temporary certificates for credential applicants approved by the County Superintendent were noted. (Attachment K)

(k) Meetings/Special Dates

Copies of the November and December activity calendars were distributed, and Mrs. Estrella-Henderson review upcoming events. She pointed out RSVP deadlines and stated that SCOE is very excited about our first JDF Graduation.

Trustee Coleman noted that Trustee Minor is being honored at the Spirit of Solano luncheon on December 3rd, and she encouraged the Board to attend.

VIII. NEW BUSINESS

(a) Revisions to Board Policy on Interdistrict Appeals

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson presented proposed changes to Board Policy 9000.21 regarding holding interdistrict attendance appeals in closed session. She reminded Members of the discussion, at the Board's Special Meeting/Study Session on September 28, 2015, about holding these appeals in closed session to protect students' privacy. Some of the information revealed during such appeals concerns disciplinary, medical, and mental health issues. Legal counsel helped prepare the proposed revisions.

Trustee Dean suggested changing the wording from closed "session" to closed "hearing" because it is a different process than a standard closed session.

Per Board Policy 9310(I)(B), there was no action taken. The proposed revisions will be brought back for a second reading and action at the December 9, 2015, regular meeting.

IX. COMMENTS FROM THE COMMUNITY

Mrs. Estrella-Henderson spoke about the Resolution recognizing the Day of the Special Educator that the Board adopted earlier in the meeting. She stated that SCOE's special education staff members have a passion for their work, often going above and beyond what is expected of them. They are a lifeline to the families of our students.

X. BOARD DISCUSSION

(a) Board Member Activity Reports

Some of the Members gave brief reports on their recent community and education-related activities.

Trustee Coleman attended two sessions of the California School Boards Association (CSBA) Masters in Governance program.

Trustee Cohen-Thompson presented the Educator of the Year Award to Dr. Ramona Bishop, Superintendent of VCUSD, during her final event as president of the Black Chamber of Commerce.

Trustee Bates attended the Boys and Girls State event hosted by the American Legion, Soroptomist film festival, parade and even honoring veterans, and distributed books from the Rotary Club to two schools.

Trustee Ford distributed handouts and reported on the California County Boards of Education (CCBE) conference that he recently attended as well as his newspaper column to be published on Friday.

(b) Board Member Requests

There were no requests by Members to represent the Board at education-related events.

(c) Suggestions on Future Board Agenda Items

- (1) Board members may suggest future topics to be coordinated by the County Superintendent and presented by SCOE staff or external presenters.

Trustee Dean believes a refresher on the Brown Act would be beneficial. Trustee Cohen-Thompson said Solano County Counsel held such a course last week. Although she has attended several refreshers, she always learns something new each time.

- (2) The Board may identify current topics of particular interest and, by consensus, choose one of its members to lead a brief discussion at a future meeting.

There were no topics proposed for potential Member-led discussions.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 7:23 PM.

NATIONAL NATIVE AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH

WHEREAS, during National Native American Heritage Month we honor the vibrant cultures, unique customs, and strong traditions of American Indians and Alaska Natives who were the first to carve out cities, domesticate crops, and call this land home; and

WHEREAS, Solano County was occupied for many centuries by Native Americans who called themselves “Patwins” with some of the Patwin village names having survived phonetically in Solano County in such modern place names as Suisun, Soscol, Ulatis, and Putah; and

WHEREAS, Sem Yeto, Christianized as Francisco Solano, was Chief of the Patwin tribe and became friends with General Mariano Guadalupe Vallejo. The boundaries of Solano County were set in 1850, and General Vallejo, as a respected member of the legislature, named the county after his friend Chief Solano; and

WHEREAS, we recognize the vast contributions of Native Americans to the arts, business, education, engineering, literature, medicine, military service, sports, science, and every facet of our society, and we acknowledge and respect the significant influence of Native Americans on our Nation’s development, government, and history, while recalling the many courageous sacrifices, forced assimilation, great adversities, and violent, painful past that they have endured and overcome; and

WHEREAS, the American culture can truly benefit from the preserved practices of native peoples including their tribal sovereignty and close relationship to the earth and all its inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, California Education Code §51204.5 specifically calls for instruction in the social sciences to include the study of the role and contributions of Native Americans to the economic, political, and social development of California and our Nation with particular emphasis on portraying the role of Native Americans in contemporary society.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Solano County Board of Education recognizes November as National Native American Heritage Month and encourages educators, students, and members of the community to learn more about the rich heritage of American Indians and Alaska Natives and the roles they have played in building and sustaining our Nation, and commemorate this occasion with appropriate instructional activities.

**RESOLUTION NO. B15-16-16
PURPLE HEART MONTH**

WHEREAS, the Solano County Office of Education and Solano County Board of Education have the highest admiration and utmost gratitude for all of the brave men and women with past or present service in our Armed Forces, and have particular compassion for those who lost their lives or are suffering from combat-related injuries; and

WHEREAS, the Purple Heart Medal traces its origins as a military honor to General George Washington’s August 7, 1782, *General Orders to the Continental Army*, which established the Badge of Military Merit directing that “whenever any singularly meritorious action is performed, the author of it shall be permitted to wear ... over the left breast, the figure of a heart in purple cloth;” and

WHEREAS, unlike the European tradition of such awards being reserved for high-ranking officers, the Badge of Military Merit could be awarded to soldiers of any rank, as in Washington’s own words, “The road to glory in a patriot army and a free country is thus open to all;” and

WHEREAS, in 1932, on the 200th anniversary of George Washington’s birth, the Badge of Military Merit was revived when the U.S. War Department authorized a new Purple Heart Medal to be awarded to any service member wounded or killed in action, retroactive to World War I service; and

WHEREAS, in 2011, the Department of Defense clarified the criteria for the Purple Heart Medal to include service members who sustain a traumatic brain injury (TBI) resulting from enemy-generated explosions; and on August 3rd, California Governor Edmund G. Brown, Jr., issued a proclamation declaring August 2011 as “Purple Heart Veterans’ Month,” followed by California becoming the first state to designate itself a “Purple Heart State” on April 12, 2012, and the County of Solano designating itself as a “Purple Heart County” on April 22, 2014; and

WHEREAS, Solano County is home to more than 40,000 veterans and over 300 living recipients of the Purple Heart Medal, while a total of nearly two million Purple Heart Medals have been awarded to combat veterans, including over 42,000 since the Vietnam War, and these figures represent the staggering amount of human suffering and unparalleled selfless sacrifices that our Veterans and service members have endured.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Solano County Board of Education wishes to honor and thank all of our courageous service members and heroic recipients of the Purple Heart Medallion for their dedication to duty, selfless sacrifice, and personal courage in defense of our beloved America and acknowledges November as “Purple Heart Month” encouraging educators, students, and citizens of our community to respect our Purple Heart Medal recipients for their service, valor, and sacrifice, and remember all our service members and veterans, the fallen and wounded, those unaccounted for, and our prisoners of war, with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities.

RESOLUTION NO. B15-16-17
CALIFORNIA RUNAWAY AND HOMELESS YOUTH AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, studies indicate that nationally between 1.6 to 2.8 million youth ages 12-24 experience homelessness for at least one night or more each year, and the latest McKinney-Vento report suggests that California’s youth accounts for about 297,617 of that figure, which continues to grow each year; and

WHEREAS, the reasons youth flee and become runaways or homeless are varied: conflict and poverty in their homes; separation from parents through death or divorce; physical, sexual, and/or emotional abuse; neglect; and exiting juvenile corrections or foster care, and they often become disconnected from educational systems and the workforce and do not possess the skills or financial, housing, and transition resources to live on their own and feel there are no other options open to them; and

WHEREAS, the percentage of unaccompanied homeless minors who are unsheltered in California stands at 79.2%, which is the second highest in the country, and the number of emergency shelter beds available to homeless youth has dropped in the past 10 years leaving many to live on the streets where they become the victims of crime and physical or sexual abuse because they are often too poor to secure basic needs, unable to access adequate medical or mental health care, and unaware of support services that are available; and

WHEREAS, only 20 of California’s 58 counties presently have programs for runaway and homeless youth, meaning that awareness of youth homelessness and its causes must be heightened to better coordinate services among the many families, businesses, law enforcement agencies, schools, and community and faith-based organizations who work to help youth in crisis remain off the streets; and

WHEREAS, the future well-being of our State depends on the value we place on our youth and the actions we take to support preventative efforts and offer helpful services that provide our most vulnerable young people with opportunities to acquire the knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to find and maintain stable housing and develop into healthy and productive adults.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Solano County Board of Education does hereby acknowledge the month of November as California Runaway and Homeless Youth Awareness Month; support the Solano County Office of Education’s Homeless Youth Services Program in helping vulnerable youth through current programs authorized under Title IV of the Social Security Act; promote training opportunities and programs that assist young people, especially foster youth, in staying off the streets and in school; and applaud the initiative of individuals as well as public and private organizations dedicated to helping prevent homelessness among youth and providing aid when prevention fails.

**AMERICAN EDUCATION WEEK/
NATIONAL EDUCATION SUPPORT PROFESSIONALS’ DAY**

WHEREAS, November 16-20, 2015, marks the 94th annual observance of American Education Week, traditionally a time to heighten community awareness of the excellence achieved every day in our schools by students and staff, celebrate those who are making a vital difference in building great public schools for our Nation’s approximately 50 million K-12 students, draw attention to the wonderful things happening in our public schools, and raise awareness about the critical need to provide every child with a quality public education; and

WHEREAS, great public schools are a basic right and the backbone of our democracy, providing young people with the tools needed to maintain our nation's precious values of freedom, civility, and equality, and bringing together adults and children, educators and volunteers, business leaders and elected officials, in a common enterprise; and

WHEREAS, every student in every classroom must be educated to achieve his or her greatest potential so that our democratic society can endure, and we must nurture young Americans’ hope for, and access to, a productive future by equipping them with both practical skills and broader intellectual abilities and by providing high educational standards so they can compete and succeed in the global society; and

WHEREAS, Wednesday, November 18, 2015, has been established to honor all of the education support professionals who recognize that our students and Nation will profit tomorrow from what we invest in education today and who tirelessly labor as an integral part of the education process be they bus drivers, cafeteria workers, clerical assistants, custodians, health service workers, librarians, maintenance staff, paraeducators, substitute educators, teachers, technology services employees, and other staff who serve our children and communities daily with care and professionalism and provide a safe and healthy learning environment for students; and

WHEREAS, all citizens in our community are affected by the quality of education in Solano County’s public schools – whether or not they have children in school – because today’s students are tomorrow’s workforce, business leaders, legislators, and community members, and the quality of their educational system directly influences the quality of life in our community for all citizens in the future.

Dear Trustees:

In order to comply with the Williams Lawsuit Settlement, current law (Section 1240 of California Education Code) requires the County Superintendent, or his/her designee, to report on schools ranked in deciles 1-3 on the 2012 Academic Performance Index (API).

The purpose of the report as specified in California Education Code (EC) Section 1240 is to describe the State of the Schools related to:

1. students having access to "sufficient instructional materials in four core subject areas (English/Language Arts, Mathematics, History/Social Science, Science) and as appropriate, science laboratory equipment, Foreign Languages, and Health";
2. compliance with facilities maintenance to determine the condition of a facility that "poses an emergency or urgent threat to the health or safety of pupils or staff"; and
3. the school providing accurate data for the annual School Accountability Report Card (SARC) related to instructional materials and facilities maintenance.

The law further requires that the County Superintendent annually monitor and review:

1. teacher misassignments in deciles 1-3 schools; and
2. quarterly reports on complaints filed with the school district concerning insufficient instructional materials, teacher vacancies and misassignment, and emergency or urgent facilities issues under the Uniform Complaint Procedure.

In addition, the County Superintendent is required to determine the condition of school facilities.

Basic terms defined:

- “Sufficient instructional materials” means every pupil, including English Language Learners, has a textbook in the four core areas to use in class and to take home each night to complete required homework assignments.
- “Facilities standards” means that each school district who receives State funding for facilities is required to establish a facilities inspection program and to ensure that each of the schools is maintained in good repair.
- “Good repair” is defined as maintaining schools that are clean, safe, and functional.

Findings:

Chart B – County Wide Results – shows accumulated data by district for all of the four districts in the six areas we monitored. This data is a compilation of all of the Williams Schools in the county.

Charts C, D, E and F are the results for each district.

In conclusion, the Solano County Office of Education is available to support any actions that need to be taken to address the needs identified in the report.
