Regular Meeting
January 11, 2012

The Solano County Board of Education met in regular session on Wednesday, January 11, 2012, at 5100 Business Center Drive in Fairfield, California.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

Board President Dr. Rozzana Verder-Aliga called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM. Board Vice President, Doug Ford, led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

III. APPROVAL AND ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Motion was made by Mr. Galvan, seconded by Mrs. Coleman, and unanimously carried by those present to approve and adopt the agenda as presented.

IV. CONSENT ITEMS

Motion was made by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mrs. Bates, and carried unanimously by a roll call vote of those present to approve the items on the consent calendar consisting of the topics listed below:

V. CORRESPONDENCE

Mr. Speck referenced a letter from Assemblymember Sandré Swanson, Chair of the Assembly Select Committee on State School Financial Takeovers, inviting him to a hearing on January 27th to discuss Vallejo City Unified School District's (VCUSD) experiences under State control. Three other districts

in VCUSD's situation will also be addressed. Each Board member received a similar invitation to attend. Mr. Speck does not plan to participate.

VI. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

(a) 2010-11 Audit Report

Ki Lam, auditor, gave a PowerPoint (PPT) presentation about the 2010-11 Audit Report prepared by Vavrinek, Trine, Day & Company, LLP. A copy of the Audit Report was provided to each Board member in advance for review.

Ms. Lam explained that the objective of the audit is to gain reasonable assurance that the Solano County Office of Education's (SCOE) financial statements are free of material misstatement. Audits are conducted in accordance with generally accepted state and federal auditing standards and procedures.

She reported on trends in the areas of SCOE's general fund balance, available reserves, budget amounts, average daily attendance (ADA), and long-term debt. The independent auditor's analysis shows that SCOE complied with state laws and regulations, and there were no findings on internal control, financial reporting, or federal compliance. Lettie Allen, Associate Superintendent of Administrative Services and Operations, commented that a report with no findings is the best audit possible, and SCOE has had several consecutive years with no audit findings because solid controls are in place.

There were no questions from the Board. Mr. Speck noted that SCOE complies with the required reserves of 3%, as shown on PPT slide #4, but presently maintains a higher percentage in order to help us endure state funding deferrals and survive the current uncertain economic climate. He thanked Mrs. Allen and members of her staff under the direction of Sandy Austin, Director of Internal Business Services, for their hard work which helped SCOE receive another excellent audit.

(b) Career and College Clubs

Lisette Estrella-Henderson, Associate Superintendent of Student Programs and Educational Services, introduced Ken Scarberry, Director of Youth Development, and Johanna Nowak-Palmer, Youth Activities Specialist, saying that Mr. Scarberry has been leading the Career and College Club (CCC) program, now in its third year, and she thanked them for implementing these efforts.

Ms. Nowak-Palmer gave an overview of the 2011-12 CCC, which is monitored by SCOE, and provided an update on its activities and successes. The CCC program is designed to help middle school students plan and assume responsibility for their future success by empowering them to prepare a college and career road map and promote a college success culture among their peers. The two-year program for 7th and 8th graders focuses on college access and career success while teaching leadership skills that enable the pupils to share information they learn with their peers.

The CCC program began in 2009 with 18 clubs in 3 Bay Area counties. In its second year, there were 38 clubs in 5 counties, and by 2011 it had grown to 69 clubs in 7 counties due to its flexibility and huge impact. Solano has some of the most successful clubs in the State with the newest starting next week in Rio Vista. Four of Solano County's six school districts have one or more clubs in their middle schools. There is now a waiting list to join the CCC, due, in part, to a lack of trained staff to guide the clubs. Grange Middle School recently won the title of 8th Grade Club of the Year and received a \$1,000 prize that will help the students learn money management.

The CCC program is so successful because of its partnerships with other agencies such as the Solano County Educational Consortium (SCEC) and the California Student Opportunity and Access Program (Cal-SOAP) which offer college-age tutors; visits to college campuses; and job shadowing in local businesses such as NorthBay Healthcare, Suisun City Water Treatment Plant, Fairfield-Suisun Sewer District, and the Chamber of Commerce. Partnering with SCOE's Career Technical Education (CTE) Department enables the clubs to hold a year-end meeting to discuss successes, complete a

final project, and build a presentation board that will be displayed at SCOE showing what they have done during the year.

Local legislators are interested in the CCC and have visited some of the clubs to see what they are about. SCOE trains the staff to work with the students and is always looking for those willing to do outreach.

Mr. Speck added that he is a big fan of this program since he strongly believes it is important to talk with students in the early grades about various careers. He is proud of Solano for having one of the largest programs even though we are one of the smallest counties. He thanked Mr. Scarberry and Ms. Nowak-Palmer for actively seeking out and bringing the CCC to Solano County and successfully marketing it because it is very beneficial for kids.

(c) Quarterly Reports on *Williams* Uniform Complaints

As part of the *Williams* Uniform Complaint Procedures, school districts and SCOE are required to report, on a quarterly basis, summary data regarding the nature and resolution of all complaints. Mrs. Estrella-Henderson reported that no complaints were filed during the period of October 1 through December 31, 2011, in any of the following three programs: Juvenile Court and Community School (JCCS), Division of Unaccompanied Children Services (DUCS), and Juvenile Detention Facility (JDF). (d) Financial Report

Mrs. Allen distributed a draft of SCOE's 2012-13 Budget Development Calendar which lists target deadlines for submitting financial reports and providing updates on the budgeting process. Next week SCOE and district staff will attend a workshop about the Governor's proposed budget for next year.

The State budget has been in the news a great deal lately. If the Governor's tax initiative passes, education will receive flat funding. Although the deferrals we have not received will be paid, it is not new revenue for schools. Passage of the tax initiative will also mean school facility bond dollars will be added to Proposition 98 funds.

If the tax initiative does not pass, education will maintain the funding we have now but will not receive the deferral money we are owed. This amounts to losing about 15 days of average daily attendance (ADA) funding. Some mandated costs will remain while others will become optional or be eliminated. Childcare and home support services will be affected, both of which negatively impact children.

The figures have not yet been finalized, and we must wait to see how the situation turns out, but school districts will undoubtedly have difficulty handling 15 fewer days of funding according to recent opinions by the California Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO).

Mr. Speck commented that the LAO report is advising districts to budget conservatively based on the anticipated \$2.4 billion reduction to education. Class sizes are already getting close to capacity, staff is being let go, and the districts are facing some big challenges. It is an awful exercise to have to go through, but it is necessary to plan for the worst. If the taxes pass, education will see a small funding cut; if they do not pass, the cuts will be devastating and will impact education almost exclusively. Mrs. Allen added that those districts with larger reserves will be best suited to survive.

Mrs. Allen reviewed the financial report for December 2011-12 stating that SCOE is in a good position in terms of cash. We received approximately \$11.9 million but had expenditures of close to \$17.7 million. Our reserves and assistance from the County Treasurer are enabling us to weather this storm. More details will be available after next week's budget workshop.

Mrs. Allen gave an update on SCOE's facilities projects. We are currently in negotiations on the price for the Golden Hills construction and anticipate bringing the matter to the Board for approval in February so we can issue the required notice to proceed by the tight deadline in early March. The

Board may wish to reconvene its Facilities Subcommittee to discuss other upcoming SCOE building projects.

(e) Human Resources Report

Janet Harden, Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources and Workforce Development, introduced Christine Long who has been a SCOE employee for about 15 years and currently works as a teacher in the Career Technical Education (CTE) Department. One of Ms. Long's New Year's resolutions is to attend more Board meetings. Mrs. Harden also recognized Ann Williams who frequently attends the Board meetings in her role as the president of the Solano County Education Association (SCEA) certificated bargaining unit.

Mrs. Harden reported on four positions filled in the past month: one new student support specialist and three vacancies filled for a special education teacher, maintenance custodian, and program manager of instructional technology.

(f) Temporary Certificates

Temporary certificates for credential applicants approved by the County Superintendent were noted. Year-to-date totals are also included on a separate chart. (Attachment E)

SCOE's 2012 Annual Report Calendar is being distributed throughout the county. Each Board member received a copy and was told that more are available if needed. Mr. Speck thanked Mrs. Estrella-Henderson and Sheldon Reber, Public Information Officer, for adding additional pages this year that contain student achievement data that was not previously included,

Some of the highlights of Mr. Speck's recent activities included attending a celebration honoring Filipino Americans Larry Asera, Dr. Rozzana Verder-Aliga, Rev. Dr. Tony Ubalde, Jr., and Bob Sampayan who were recently elected to local offices. He also played Santa Claus for the students at the Irene Larsen Center as he has done for many years. On January 3rd, Mr. Speck celebrated his one-year anniversary as the County Superintendent. Looking ahead to January, he

has been invited to participate in the America's Promise Graduation Nation program and will go to Washington D.C. with others from the First 5 Solano Children and Families Commission to talk about our successful local preschool program.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

(a) Decennial Trustee Area Redistricting

Education Code requires that, following each decennial census, county board trustee areas must be analyzed and realigned, if necessary, to account for population shifts. The Board studied proposed adjustments to trustee area boundaries during its regular meetings on November 9 and December 14, 2011, and made recommended changes. Mrs. Allen distributed to each member a copy of the latest trustee area map showing the requested revisions on the border between Areas 3 and 5 in what is commonly called the Lower Sky Valley area stretching from I-680 to the Vallejo City border. Also distributed was a chart of demographic information for each trustee area.

Motion was made by Mr. Galvan, seconded by Mrs. Bates, and unanimously carried by a vote of those present to adopt the changes to the Board's trustee area boundaries as presented and forward the matter to the County Committee on School District Organization for final approval. A Committee meeting will be scheduled to immediately follow the regular Board meeting in February.

VIII. COMMENTS FROM THE COMMUNITY

Mrs. Williams commented that SCOE's Annual Report Calendar is very nice, and those responsible did a great job putting it together. Dr. Verder-Aliga asked if Mr. Speck planned to present copies to the students whose art appears in the calendar and to the district governing board members as has been done in prior years. Mr. Speck stated that, instead of a personal presentation this year, the calendars are being sent to the boards and art teachers to distribute.

IX. BOARD DISCUSSION

(a) Board Member Reports

Some of the Board members gave a brief report on their recent activities including visits to any of SCOE's program sites and attendance at educational conferences and workshops.

Mrs. Coleman was sworn in as a new Juvenile Justice Commissioner, and Solano County selected a new Chief Probation Officer.

Mrs. Bates was sworn in as an honorary commander at Travis Air Force Base before a crowd of over 200 people. She has been assigned to the 15th Air Mobility Squadron and will shadow its commander. Due to her past military experience, she is looking forward to her new responsibilities and would like to invite her commander to a future board meeting. She also delivered books to schools as part of a Rotary Club program. Tomorrow she plans to attend the countywide Poverty Summit in Fairfield.

Mr. Galvan also attended the event in Vallejo honoring newly elected Filipino Americans, and he circulated a newspaper article showing a photo of Dr. Verder-Aliga, Mr. Asera, and the other honorees at the event,

Mr. Ford attended a very interesting seminar at U.C. Davis on bioinformatics, also called genome sequencing, and wrote about it in his newspaper column. He encouraged the members to read the article for more details about this fascinating topic.

Dr. Verder-Aliga was honored at the event for four local Filipino Americans recently elected into office. She also attended a reception hosted by Mr. Asera for Congressman Mike Thompson who is the new representative to the congressional district that includes Benicia, Vallejo, and the surrounding area. Mrs. Bates was also there. Dr. Verder-Aliga wished the Board and staff a happy new year, and she is looking forward to serving in 2012.

(b) Suggestions on future Board agenda items

The following topics were suggested for future Board meeting presentations:

- Mrs. Bates would like to invite the Commander of the 15th Air Mobility Squadron to talk about community partnerships with Travis Air Force Base.
- Mrs. Coleman would like Solano County's new Chief Probation Officer, Christopher Hansen, to present on topics of common interest pertaining to at-risk students.

X. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 6:58 PM.

RESOLUTION NO. B11-12-15
FRED KOREMATSU DAY OF CIVIL LIBERTIES AND THE CONSTITUTION

WHEREAS, the battle for civil liberties has been championed by ordinary Americans who have had the courage to stand up and fight for their basic Constitutional rights; and Civilian Exclusion Order 34, based on the federal Executive Order 9066, which imposed strict curfew regulations and required 120,000 Japanese Americans to leave their homes to be incarcerated in American concentration camps during World War II; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Fred Korematsu was arrested and convicted, but fought back because he believed the conviction went against the basic freedoms guaranteed to him by the U.S. Constitution; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Korematsu's conviction was ultimately overturned in 1984 – a decision that influenced the U.S. government's passage of the Civil Liberties Act of 1988, which recognized that a grave injustice was done by forced relocation and incarceration of civilian Americans because of wartime prejudice; and

WHEREAS, current California law designates a number of days as having special significance, when public schools are encouraged to observe and conduct suitable commemorative exercises as specified; and

WHEREAS, the History-Social Science Framework for California Public Schools, Kindergarten through Grade Twelve, states that the history curriculum at each grade level relating to community, state, region, nation, and the world must reflect and integrate the experiences of men and women of different racial, religious, and ethnic groups; and

WHEREAS, the California Assembly and State Senate passed AB 1775, the Fred Korematsu Day of Civil Liberties and the Constitution, without opposition, and Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger signed this bill into law on September 23, 2010.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Solano County Board of Education encourages all schools and teachers to observe the second annual Fred T. Korematsu Day of Civil Liberties and the Constitution on or near January 30th of each year, conduct exercises commemorating the life of Fred Korematsu, and recognize the importance of preserving civil liberties, even in times of real or perceived crisis.


