February 10, 2010

The Solano County Board of Education met in regular session on Wednesday, February 10, 2010, at 5100 Business Center Drive in Fairfield, California.

I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG

Board President Larry Asera called the meeting to order at 6:03 PM. Vice President Dr. Rozzana Verder-Aliga, Trustee Area 7, led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

III. APPROVAL AND ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Motion was made by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mrs. Bates, and unanimously carried by those present to approve and adopt the agenda as presented.

V. CORRESPONDENCE

Mrs. Alarcón shared the following items of correspondence: (1) SCOE's recent shoe drive for Haitian relief netted about 500 pairs, while the entire program, as reported by partners Soles 4 Souls and Sport Chalet, collected close to 1 million pairs of shoes; (2) Travis Credit Union sent out a press release announcing the appointment of Mrs. Alarcón to its Board of Directors.

VI. SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

(a) Renewable Energy Grants for Schools

Alisa Okelo-Odongo, Public Affairs Representative for Pacific Gas and Electric Company in Solano, Yolo, and Sacramento counties, presented information about PG&E's "Bright Ideas" Grants for Schools program aimed at promoting environmental stewardship. She met Mr. Asera at a few Chamber of Commerce events, and he asked her to come talk about how PG&E's grants may help schools with additional funding at a time when they are facing unprecedented cutbacks.

She distributed a handout explaining the two aspects of PG&E's Solar Schools Program for which teachers can apply online: (1) Bright Ideas Grants are designed to support the understanding of renewable energy in public schools in one of five areas: solar projects, energy and environmental programs, renewable energy or science related fieldtrips, green school projects, or professional development/service learning projects/workforce development programs. Awards are typically up to \$250,000. To date, PG&E has contributed \$155,000 to Solano County teachers and schools through grants at Grace Patterson Elementary and Vallejo Middle School, both in Vallejo; solar installation at Padan Elementary School in Vacaville; holiday wish grants for 14 schools in Fairfield-Suisun, Vacaville, and Vallejo; and training of 120 Solano County teachers. (2) Teacher Training Programs are free one-day solar energy courses covering a substitute stipend, lunch, and valuable networking time. Participants receive instruction and materials to implement innovative hands-on energy units in their classrooms.

She also spoke of PG&E's Safe Kids Program that provides teachers and students with free educational materials, group activities, facilitated discussions, experiments, quizzes, and interactive online games that help teach the importance of safe energy practices and are tied to national and state teaching standards.

Ms. Okelo-Odongo answered questions from the Board and said there has been an increase in the number of applications being received. She will forward the statistics showing the upward trend. Mrs. Allen added that PG&E will soon be conducting energy audits at SCOE's sites in an effort to save costs. Although SCOE may not be eligible for some of the grant programs due to our participation in the state's Hardship Program, many of our programs are located on district sites and may share in some of the benefits when their schools apply for a PG&E grant.

(b) Alternative Education Report

Rick Vaccaro, Director of Alternative Education, gave an update on the academic programs at the Golden Hills Community School and Juvenile Detention Facility (JDF).

New Foundations houses 30 juveniles at JDF. Residence is court ordered for four months, and the mental health component is a vital part of the program.

There are five classrooms at JDF. The student to staff ratio is 15:1:1 with a maximum of 20 students due to classroom space. Staff is careful to not place rival gang members in a classroom together so all students will be safe and can concentrate on their studies. The Redwood Academy houses the juveniles with serious felony charges and concentrates on the four core subjects plus

electives. Sycamore Academy houses male wards age 15-18, and course selection depends on the length of stay. Sequoia Academy accommodates the younger males and female wards. Since the average stay for this population is shorter, the program concentrates on Accelerated Reader and math. The average stay is 15-21 days. Longer terms involve transcript evaluations to ensure appropriate class placements. Some juveniles are in the program for up to two years awaiting a move to state prison. Students can get a high school diploma if they finish the required credits before exiting.

The community school classes at Golden Hills Education Center are contracted by Fairfield-Suisun Unified School District to serve its students that have been expelled or released from JDF or New Foundations and need a place to attend for the remainder of the semester. The minimum stay is one semester. The student to staff ratio is 24:1:1, but daily attendance is usually about 20. Students are placed by grade level and safety concerns. Teachers and paraeducators receive staff development from the local Gang Task Force to help curtail violence and disruptions. Don Sneed is the Intervention Specialist who worked for many years at JDF and serves in a capacity similar to an assistant principal. His efforts are one of the main keys to success because he is familiar with many of the kids and their families. Each child and family undergoes an intake interview and must sign a contract containing behavior expectations. There is zero tolerance for violence, and strategic staff positioning before, during, and after school helps keep fights down. The program has a good success rate in returning the students to district schools. The career preparation class is well received and instrumental in teaching valuable skills.

In response to questions from the Board members, Mr. Vaccaro stated that the Golden Hills program is only for FSUSD students. Other districts manage their own community school programs. A positive newspaper article appeared last week about the program, and he is pleased that the good work happening there is being recognized.

(c) Annual Report to the Community Calendar

Sheldon Reber, Public Information Officer, presented SCOE's 2010 annual report calendar. This year's theme contained fast facts about education, which is a mix of good and sobering news. The calendar, once again, features student artwork. He and Mrs. Alarcón have been honoring the student artists by making presentations at their local school board meetings. He expressed thanks to Johanna Nowak, Youth Activities Specialist, for coordinating the annual Student Art Faire and Brian White of White's Graphics in Benicia for taking the professional photos and designing the calendar layout. Many of the art pieces are on display at SCOE for a year and can be seen on SCOE's website. Additional calendars can be obtained from Sheldon.

(d) Financial Report

Lettie Allen, Associate Superintendent of Administrative Services and Operations, presented the 2009-10 financial reports for January and December (which was postponed from the Board's regular meeting in January). January's situation has improved, probably because of the taxes that were received by the county treasurer in December. Deferred payments by the state are impacting SCOE and all the school districts.

Mrs. Allen provided an update on the Governor's proposed budget saying there were several things in it that will be harmful to education. There will be a negative cost of living adjustment (COLA) going into next year. Several areas have yet to be defined including proposed cuts to central administration and consolidation of programs and services offered by county offices of education on a regional basis. Cuts of \$201-\$250 per Average Daily Attendance (ADA) are also estimated. If California does not get the \$7 billion in federal funds for which it has applied, there is concern that further cuts will come from education to make up for the shortfall. We are watching matters closely to see what happens.

SCOE is beginning its 2010-11 budget development. Reserves helped us through this year, but next year we are looking at a loss of about \$725,000 in revenue limit over last year and across-the-

board reductions. We are waiting to see what comes out of the special legislative session and the Governor's May budget revision, and our contingency plans will be implemented, if necessary.

(e) Human Resources Report

Jay Speck, Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, reported that two employees had been hired by SCOE in recent weeks; a campus monitor at T.C. McDaniel Center and a resource specialist at the Juvenile Detention Facility.

He also talked about the Global Connect automated phone messaging system being implemented by SCOE. The primary purpose of the system is to be able to contact all parents and staff quickly in case of an emergency. The desire for this type of system came about as a result of issues surrounding H1N1 and the need to inform parents and staff of school closures. Many school districts are already effectively using a similar system. SCOE is in the process of verifying current phone numbers that will be used in the Global Connect database to place the automated calls.

The Board members also asked Mrs. Allen to have the Technology Department staff look into the large amount of junk mail finding its way into their SCOE e-mail. They would like to know why the spam filter does not seem to be blocking it.

(f) Temporary Certificates

Temporary certificates for credential applicants approved by the County Superintendent were noted. (Attachment F)

Also distributed were invitations to the Solano Youth Ag Day to be held Thursday, March 18, from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM at the Vallejo fairgrounds. Those members who were unable to attend the Solano County School Boards Association meeting on February 1st received a copy of the keynote speaker's presentation handouts.

Mrs. Alarcón's recent activities included continuing to meet with each district superintendent and his/her cabinet members to see how SCOE can help them as they are faced with further budget cuts. The consensus seems to be that the districts no longer have funds for professional development and need SCOE to provide more of it. The districts also want to collaborate with SCOE on grants that will increase funding. Monthly meetings with the California Department of Education and the Vallejo City USD continue, but SCOE is not involved with the district's school closure committee, as that is a local matter.

VII. NEW BUSINESS

(a) 2010 Census in Schools Week

Mrs. Allen reported that April 1st is Census Day. The census determines legislative representation, community services, and federal funding, so it is important to count everyone. She distributed information that included a sample of the census form that contains only 10 questions, none of which ask for financial information or immigration status. Census forms are scheduled to be mailed

to households in mid-March. SCOE is coordinating efforts with the districts. Superintendents attended a presentation in January, and we will provide them with scripts for their district automated phone messaging systems, fact sheets, website links, posters, and other helpful materials.

After the census is complete, County Board of Education trustee areas will be reviewed and adjusted as necessary.

Motion was made by Mr. Ford, seconded by Mrs. Bates, and unanimously carried by a roll call vote of those present to approve Resolution No. B09-10-15 encouraging participation in the 2010 Census to help ensure an accurate count for the financial, legislative, social, and educational well-being of our community. VIII. COMMENTS FROM THE COMMUNITY

IX. BOARD DISCUSSION

(a) Board Member Reports

Board members were given an opportunity to make a brief report on their recent activities including visits to any of SCOE's program sites.

Mr. Ford reported on recent brain research that followed 4-year-olds for several years and revealed that their behavior patterns throughout life were already established at the age of four. This has important implications for education pertaining to preschool programs and parenting education.

Mrs. Bates' activities included the following: attending a Vallejo Chamber of Commerce Education Committee meeting as the members plan for a dropout summit in April; funeral for a former Fairfield-Suisun USD principal; Martin Luther King, Jr., programs at Solano Community College and Touro University; acted in a local production of the play "The 25th Annual Putman County Spelling Bee;" Omega Boys & Girls Club fundraiser dinner; retirement dinner for Ruth Begell, Executive Director of the Solano County Library Foundation; Solano EDC luncheon; Regional Academic Decathlon interviews; Solano County School Boards Association dinner; and dinner with actor Tom Hanks at a fundraiser for the Solano Community College theatre. She also thanked those members who handed out awards at this year's Academic Decathlon.

Dr. Verder-Aliga attended a Martin Luther King, Jr., event at Hogan High School, the Solano EDC luncheon, a crab feed for the Bethel High School band boosters, and several events in the Filipino community.

Mr. Asera distributed awards at the Academic Decathlon and attended the Solano EDC luncheon.

(b) Suggestions on future Board agenda items

There were no suggestions for future agenda topics.
